MIC This year began its new Global Leadership Program for highly motivated students who want to improve their communities and the world. Students who enter the

program take special classes that will help them to improve their communication and academic skills and prepare for leadership at the local, national, and global levels. Students who complete the Global Leadership Program will be ready to go to graduate school in Japan or abroad, become national civil servants, or work for international organizations, companies, and NGOs.

The Global Leadership Program's special classes will help students

improve critical thinking and communication skills in order to identify public problems, write and speak persuasively, and become group leaders. Students will also develop independent projects to address global concerns such as the environment, peace, and human development. Finally, students will gain valuable experience through faculty mentoring, volunteer activities, participation in internships in Japan and abroad. If you are a student who wants to make the world a better place, then MIC's Global Leadership Program can help you achieve your goals.

LIBERAL ARTS AND GLOBAL LEADERSHIP GO HAND-IN-HAND

Miyazaki International College (MIC) was founded as an International Liberal Arts College in 1994, and International Liberal Arts remains its centerpiece. Liberal Arts is about studying a range of disciplines using the skills of active learning and critical thinking in order to become effective citizens in a variety of jobs. Our

international focus and English curriculum help us to produce effective global citizens as well. In fact, all students take classes in Introduction to Global Citizenship, which emphasizes this dimension. In addition, all students spend some time on a Study Abroad program designed to both improve their language skills and develop a more practical global perspective for their future careers. In their last two years students can opt for Global Leadership or chose among three majors emphasize specific skill areas that students wish to concentrate on. MIC FACULTY AND STUDENTS PROMOTE PEACE-BUILDING

Volunteerism, conflict resolution and peacebuilding are essential endeavors for today's leaders. MIC faculty and students take these activities very seriously. In this article we will introduce the experience our faculty and students had in Taiwan with the Northeast Asia Regional Peacebuilding Institute (NARPI).

NARPI promotes peace in the region by creating space for collaborative learning and by building networks among people in Northeast Asia. Last summer, the institute was held in Mongolia, and this summer it was held in Taipei from August 7 to August 21. College students and professionals from many Asian countries attended. The national or cultural background of participants included Japan, Korea, Taiwan, China, Philippines, Mongolia, Canada and the US. The workshopbased courses were active. collaborative and taught completley in English. During the fieldwork, five MIC students visited important cultural and historical places such as 228 Memorial Museum and the National Palace Museum with other participants. Learning in seminar sessions and on fieldtrips was collaborative. Students shared views and insights with each other, enjoyed great Taiwanese cuisine and visited popular sites such as Jiufen (九份), the model for the town in the movie, Spirited Away (千と千尋). Next year, NAPRI will be held in Japan.



STUDENT PERSPECTIVES ON PEACE

describe the experience from the perspective of the students who participated from MIC.

In the two-week NARPI summer program we learned and experienced what peace is. I took two classes: "Theory and Practice of Peace Education" and "Nonviolent Struggle for Social Change".

In the former class, I studied how to teach students the basic principles of peace. Young people today, including myself, have started losing interest in



thinking about what we can do to make the world a more peaceful place. We learned theories and plenty of games, which even children can enjoy, that will help to remedy this situation. It was so surprising to learn that we can find ways to explain what peace or war is in such interesting ways.

In the latter class, we learned about practical nonviolent ways to achieve recognition and assistance from the government. As we learned how to

take

nonviolent action, we had to come up with ways to achieve social change that benefit both the government and the people on the opposite side. It was also educational to realize that you cannot always find the right solution for everyone.

For some of the participants, these classes provided the opportunity to think for the first time about how to make unreasonable things change. Peace is the only state in which all people can feel settled and safe, even if we have different ideas about what it means to be satisfied. My two weeks with NARPI were a good opportunity to look at various problems in our society and to learn how to resolve them. If you are truly interested in contributing to the resolution of the social problems in the modern world, NARPI and other programs pursuing similar goals are a good place to start.

SELECTING A MAJOR TRACK IT'S YOUR LIFE, YOUR CHOICE, YOUR FUTURE

Making the right choices in university can be difficult. Sometimes there are too many options to choose from. Professors in the School of International Liberal Arts of MIC guide students through the process of making choices for their futures. The possibilities are endless, but the choice is always yours to make.

One of the most important decisions you will make in MIC is your selection of your specialized major. All of the

majors at MIC have a firm foundation in the Liberal Arts, but each leads you along clearly different tracks. MIC offers students three distinct tracks of study to prepare for their future careers—the Liberal Arts Specialist Track, the English Teacher Track and the Global Leadership Track.

The Liberal Arts Specialist Track helps students to develop a broad knowledge and understanding of the diverse and important connections between different issues and cultures, and prepares them to apply these important universal skills to any career students choose. Graduates work for airlines, hotels, global and domestic businesses, banks and the civil services (city hall, police, fire department, etc.) Many also go to graduate school.

Students on the English Teacher Track gain perspectives on issues in psychology, English language and literature, education and so on. This program trains students to become excellent English Teachers with high level English skills. There are about 150 graduates today working as English teachers in junior high schools and high schools, or as elementary school teachers.

The new Global Leadership Track will lead students on the path to becoming leaders in their communities and globally. Students take courses in global leadership, conflict resolution and so on, and take part in internships and volunteer activities where they work closely with their host organizations to solve real-life problems to help better and regional global society. Graduates in the Global Leadership Track will go to graduate school, work for government organizations, NGO's, NPO's, JICA, JETRO, etc.

The possibilities are endless. It is your life, your choice, your future.
